
> **Plastic Free July** is a global movement to reduce single-use plastics by making simple changes to products we use every day and reduce plastic waste ending up in the environment.


If we all make small changes it will collectively make a huge difference to our communities. Choosing to refuse single-use plastics for July and beyond will help you to find great alternatives and


develop new habits that reduce your waste, environmental impact and support more sustainable products and industries.

**Compost collection** Lots of residents came by for a chat and to pick up compost made available from the Community Centre during the Boules/Celebration Day on 4th July. Nearly £100 in donations will go to the Community Centre fundraising campaign. The compost is made in a 3-bin system using grass and green cuttings from the local area, including the Blue Heart verges. **Blue Hearts** During July and August we are cutting back the Blue Heart verges, mainly by scything to minimise environmental impact. The cuttings will be composted and available as a soil conditioner for the community next year. This all helps reduce the fertility of the soil over time, enabling more wild flowers to thrive in future. We hope this will also be a spur to more local verge management responding to the biodiversity crisis we all face.





Weir Pool Working Party Can you help us remove the aquatic grasses in Weir Pool on Saturday 10th July? This planned management will provide areas of open water for amphibians and invertebrates. It will also reduce the nutrients in the pool and improve the look of this historic cart pull.

# Local trees with a story to tell - Tulip tree Nigel de Berker

One of the more exotic trees to be seen growing in a private garden alongside Marshfield High Street, is a young Tulip tree. The species is within the Magnolia family and is native to USA, introduced to Britain from Virginia c.1650. Around May-June large primitive yellow-green tulip-like flowers develop, hidden amongst foliage - each leaf with a broad truncated tip. The species can reach considerable size and is a major timber producer in USA. Not far from Marshfield, there is a mature specimen over 30m tall on Mason's Hill, Bradford-on- Avon
