


#### Newsletter 25 - Autumn/Winter 2023

# Wild Flower surveys of Blue Heart Verges

During the year we have been assessing how successful the Blue



Our second survey was in July. An original survey of the verges had taken place in July 2020 and we wanted to survey at the same time of year to see which wild flowers survived since the first seeding and how the verges had fared in the meantime. We found 20 species at Sheepfair Lane, 26 at Little End and 24 at the Community Centre. Compared to the 2020 survey the number of species has gone up at Little End and the Community Centre but was slightly down at Sheepfair with 20 this year compared to 24 in 2020. In each verge there has been a shift in the wildflower community with some species gone, new ones arriving and some of the originals still present. For example, 'Fox and Cubs' Pilosella aurantiaca is one of 14 species that has disappeared from the Sheepfair Lane verge although there were 10 new species too. Maybe the verges are settling down and finding their natural rhythm, time will tell.

Our plant lists have gone to the Parish Council to begin to establish a record. We aim to see what does well here, what we may lose and what new species may find their way to our verges. We have plenty of wildflower expertise in the village and also the support of a locally respected botanist. She felt the Community Centre verge seemed settled and healthy. As well as a good variety of species none of these were rampant and though not included in the count she noticed a number of different grasses as well, another clear indicator of the verge's overall health.

## **Ash Dieback**

Ash Dieback is now rife in the local hedgerows and verges. Most trees in the roads around Marshfield are now affected in one way or another and are a couple of years away from dying. Just across the border in Wiltshire the extensive tree cover either side of the A420 has been cut down and shipped for burning to generate electricity. Thankfully an extensive replanting





programme has gone some way to minimise environmental impact. Sadly, a similar plan of clearance on the Tolldown Road, on Marshfield's northern boundary, did not seesimilar replanting done, due to different policies for replacing felled trees, not necessarily in the same places. Replanting young trees in the roadside margins to speed regeneration is frowned upon.

Last year SM sought out a few farmers to identify suitable corners of farmland to plant new trees and mitigate the impact of our forthcoming

loss of these important features in our landscape. A small number were planted on Garston Farm and

Bond's lorry pound off Tormarton Road. We're looking to repeat the process this year - If you have a farm or small holding that has an unfilled corner that could host a tree, please let us know.

### **Community Harvest Bring & Share Supper with Apple Pressing**

This was a day of true community cohesion and activity at the Community Centre. Throughout the afternoon we had a steady stream of people with their apples for Louise Wirick's capable Apple Pressing expertise, helped by many others, which provided plenty of juice for the evening too. 
